


On the Radar

Community Services

Museums, libraries and heritage

Te Awamutu Library is working on something exciting – **creating a Library of Things!** This collection means people will soon be able to hire all manner of items for a small fee – including a sewing machine, spinning wheel, a GoPro camera, musical instruments and even a set of giant dominoes. We're hoping to launch this to our customers later this month or early April, and plan to add more cool stuff to the collection as we can.

We're looking forward to hosting Cambridge author and musician Holly Christina (right) at the Cambridge Library at 5.30pm on Friday, March 28, as she performs and talks about her third novel in the Harp and the Lyre climate fiction series.

This initiative, led by local artist Lee Samuels and funded through the Creative Community Scheme, aimed to raise awareness for mental health.

More than 200 people registered, and picked up a small canvas from the library to paint or decorate however they liked. Of the 150 canvases returned for the exhibition, 60 were sold, with all proceeds going towards future creative projects supporting the mental health of people living with disabilities.

Reserves planning



Parks Week was a fantastic success. There was **great engagement from the community** participating in Zumba in the Park (though the Te Awamutu session was cancelled due to the weather), Novels in Nature and Kids' Storytime events, all held outdoors. We had people of all ages taking part, and many requested more sessions. With this positive feedback, we're looking at holding more of these events in the future.

Hockey turf update

A solution for **Cambridge High School's hockey turf** is a step closer. Sport Waikato have let us know that the NZ Hockey Strategy is soon to be released, which recommends our region prioritises waterless turfs and multi-sport turf development over single sport surfaces. This strategy will be a key resource for funding applications, and guide the desired solution for Cambridge High School.

Community assets

Renewing playgounds makes them hugely more popular with our communities!

Data has come in from surveys held over the last two summers at a number of our playgrounds, and as both Kings Garden in Cambridge and Te Awamutu War Memorial Park had been renewed in the 12 months between the surveys, we were able to measure the impact the makeovers had.


Kings Garden had an amazing 3000 percent increase in use among tamariki aged 5 to 10! There was also a strong increase in use from 13+-year-olds at Kings Garden (800 percent) and TA War Memorial Park (238 percent).


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Local tamariki testing out the Kings Garden playground

The graphs below show the numbers for each age bracket. The surveys were undertaken 9am-5pm, Wednesday to Sunday through the months of December to March. The aim is to provide a snapshot of usage and customer preference at the parks and allows us to accurately plan and develop renewal programmes.





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Arts policy review

A review has kicked off for the Arts Policy 2018, which sets out how Council manages public art, especially art gifted to Council. We're proposing renaming it the Public Art Policy, to better show its intent.

The review will also aim to:

- · Clarify and improve operational matters such as delegations and deaccessioning of art
- · Align the policy with Ahu Ake
- Separate internal and external processes
- · Align in style with other council policies
- · Make the policy more user-friendly for the public.

The review does not require community consultation as the changes to the policy are minor and operational. It is anticipated the policy will be tabled with Ngā Iwi Tōpū o Waipā due to their involvement with drafting the original policy and mana whenua will be asked for feedback. A workshop will be held on April 9 with more information on the proposed changes.

Transport



Signs are going up for Cambridge's CBD parking trial extension, which became effective yesterday (Thursday, March 13). We will put the updated parking map on our website as soon as it comes back from the designers.

Retailers requested we reconsider parking time limits in the town centre after a similar trial was launched in Te Awamutu.

The one-hour limit is being extended to 90 minutes along Victoria Street between Alpha Street and Commerce Street, Duke Street between Hallys Lane and Anzac Street, Empire Street between Alpha and Duke Streets, and Commerce Street between Duke Street and Milicich Place.

Economic development

Waipā's economy is showing strong signs of recovery, according to some key insights from the Infometrics Quarterly Monitor for the period to December 2024, released at the end of last month.

While the Waipā economy contracted 0.2 percent over the year – the first contraction since June 2020 – the fall is smaller than the national decline of 0.5 percent. In addition, business counts rose 1.4 percent in the year to December, showing entrepreneurs' confidence despite difficult trading conditions. Consumer spending grew 2.4 percent, outpacing the 2.2 percent rate of inflation over the same period, and employment rose 0.2 percent.

Growth was driven by education and healthcare, offset by declines in construction.

Meanwhile, the unemployment rate rose to 3.5 percent – the highest level since March 2017 – but is much lower than the national rate of 4.7 percent.

Housing affordability has improved a little, with the average house price in the district now 6.8 times the average household income. This was due to a combination of house prices falling 0.3 percent per annum, and the average household income rising 4.8 percent over the year to December. However, this rise in incomes did not help rental affordability, as residential rents rose 5.5 percent.

Farmers will be smiling after a few difficult years, with strong growth in global dairy prices. Fonterra is estimating a farmgate milk price midpoint for 2024-25 of \$10/kg of milk solids, well above last season's final price of \$7.83/kg.

The total dairy payout to Waipā is estimated to be around \$753 million, up \$176 million from last season. Of course, improved revenue for Waipā farmers will help support the district's economy.



Regulatory

As Wayne mentioned this week, a date has been set for the **resource consent hearing for the sand quarry proposed for Cambridge.** It will be a joint hearing with the Waikato Regional Council, held at Council Chambers in Te Awamutu, and is scheduled to run from Wednesday, April 2 until Friday, April 4, starting at 9.30am.

Auckland-based planning consultant Richard Blakey will chair, with Waikato local Tim Manukau and Marlborough-based environmental scientist Dr Ngaire Phillips joining him on the panel. There are 44 submitters who have stated they wish to be heard.

The revised Local Alcohol Policy came into force on 10 March and can be seen here.

Councils can develop a policy to establish their positions on licensing matters such as the location, number and trading hours of licensed premises. This is then applied as necessary by the District Licensing Committee.

The main operational changes are:

- The number of off licences (bottle stores, groceries and supermarkets) in the defined CBD areas is limited to the number currently in force
- The maximum hours of on-licences (hotels, taverns, restaurants etc) is reduced from 2am to 1am as these licences are renewed.
- All licensees have received notification of this directly, as required as part of the review process.



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New MPI Food Levy

Central Government has passed legislation to allow the Ministry of Primary Industries to collect an **annual food levy** from registered food businesses, to help fund safety rules, education and standards, and the obligation to collect this has been passed to councils. The fee for the year from July 1 is \$66.13.

To make this as easy as possible, we are likely to add this to the existing registration process for businesses that register with us annually. Lower risk premises with a two-year registration period will receive it separately.

The Ministry has advised they will be in contact with all food premises soon. More information can be found on the <u>Ministry's website</u>.
