# **Community Services**

# Park operations

**Dead fish have been found in Lake Te Koo Utu** over the last two days – staff have removed around 90 from the lake edge since Wednesday morning, with more visible but out of reach.

The lake water quality is monitored each month, and while the cause of death is not yet known, early advice from Waikato Regional Council scientist Mat Allen is that it could be related to a flush of contaminants/nutrients into the lake from the recent heavy rain following the dry summer. So far, the fish we have retrieved are non-native, pest species.

Staff have implemented an action plan, based on previous experience with mass fish deaths at Lake Ngā Roto. Mana whenua have been notified, and a contractor will use a boat to retrieve dead fish from the centre of the lake, beginning this afternoon (Thursday, April 24). We will monitor and remove more as needed over the weekend.

This will break the cycle of contamination, and reduce the risks of potential harm to birdlife.

We are advising the community via our usual communication channels, and will get some signage up at the lakeside this afternoon

Paws in Pages is coming to Waipā! Reading to dogs is a recognised therapy programme used around the world and helps children with both reading ability and confidence. Reading aloud is an important part of learning literacy, but many tamariki and rangatira struggle with fears of being judged or laughed at for their mistakes. The solution – read to a calm and friendly dog instead!

Children will be able to register for a fortnightly 20-minute reading session (which includes a safety briefing), where they can sit and read to a well-behaved and gentle dog from Canine Friends Pet Therapy. A dog handler and library staff member will facilitate the session.

There are many benefits for children, and you can learn more about the programme here.

- · It can help children relax while reading
- It can help oral fluency which leads to better literacy
- It improves confidence and teaches safe ways to interact with dogs
- It is less intimidating than reading to people as dogs don't judge, laugh or criticise
- It allows children to proceed at their own pace

The programme will start at the Cambridge Library from Wednesday, April 30 and we plan to then roll it out to Te Awamutu Library.

# Te Awamutu War Memorial Park

We're **replacing the bollards around the netball courts** at Te Awamutu War Memorial Park. The tender closed on April 9, and the contract is expected to be awarded within the next week, with work to start in early May.

The same contractor will also install new bollards along the Racecourse Road frontage to restrict vehicle access to the park from here – as this has previously caused damage to the reserve.

Partners and stakeholders have been notified via the Te Awamutu War Memorial Park Partners and Stakeholders Forum, and we've been in touch directly with the Te Awamutu Netball Centre. To ensure Document Settl Dul 1699706 netballers and their supporters, we've agreed to the following:

Uninterrupted pedestrian access will be maintained at all times between the carpark and the netball courts.

- · From 3pm onwards on weekdays, at least 75% of the carpark will remain available for netball court users.
- . On weekends, the entire carpark will remain fully open and accessible to netball court users.

# **Community assets**

We're working with Waipā Community Facilities Trust (Go Waipā) over the potential **renewal of naming rights** for the Te Awamutu Events Centre, stadium and swimming complex.

Previous agreements with Trust Waikato and ASB have lapsed, and the agreement that Go Waipā took up with Livingstone Building NZ Ltd for the aquatic centre expires next February.

We are writing to Go Waipā to confirm the approach and process, as our service agreement states that any naming rights agreements are Council's responsibility to facilitate.

The Perry Aquatic Centre naming rights are current until 2030.



# Reserves planning





### Lake Ngā Roto Constructed Wetland Maintenance

Over the past month, we've been cleaning up the constructed treatment wetland on the north-eastern side of Lake Ngā Roto. The system has a series of strategically planted ponds, both deep and shallow, which remove sediment and reduce nutrient flow from adjoining farmland, which helps to protect water quality within the lake.

The work included removing sediment and cleaning the various connecting channels. We also removed the outflowing culverts and replaced them with footbridges which will be easier to maintain, and will enable better waterflow. This is the first time we've carried out maintenance on the system since it was installed in 2016.

The neighbouring farm, which is managed by seemed is likely to see improved drainage as a result.

# Waikato Expressway roadworks

NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi has let us know of more road repairs that will cause disruption on the Cambridge section of SH1 Waikato Expressway over the next few weeks.

### Tīrau Road interchange - Sunday, May 4 to Friday, May 9.

There will be Stop/Go management and on- and off-ramp closures between the SH1 Tirau Road interchange and Hickey Road each night from 8pm to 5am. Detours will be in place to use the Victoria Road interchange.

## Victoria Road interchange - Sunday, May 11 to Thursday, May 15.

The northbound on-ramp from Victoria Road to SH1 will be closed between 8pm and 5am each night. Light vehicles will be detoured via the Cambridge West interchange. Heavy and large vehicles will be detoured via SH1B and SH26 to re-join SH1.

Emergency services will be given priority through the worksites. Both works are weather dependent and updates can be found on the NZTA Journey Planner: nzta.govt.nz/traffic

# Autumn leaf collection

On Monday, April 28, we will start our **annual leaf collection for designated streets in Cambridge, Te Awamutu and Kihikihi** that are affected by fallen leaves from our beautiful mature street trees. The collection will run through to the end of July and will be carried out by council's street cleaning contractor, Eco Maintenance.

We are advising residents on the designated streets to:

- Heap fallen leaves in a pile on the grass berm in front of their properties, close to the kerb, two days before their collection day.
- Remove sticks and branches from the piles and ensure leaves are not swept into the streets or drains to avoid flooding.

We're also reminding them that we can't collect piles that include general garden waste, prunings or lawn clippings.

# Cambridge Wastewater Treatment Plant

It's been a busy couple of months on the project, with significant progress on site including the bioreactor, plant building, chemical area and lift pump station. We're implementing a communications strategy to keep the community regularly updated now that the construction work is nearing completion, with the main physical works on track to be finished next March.

We've stood up a Project Control Group to oversee the final stages of construction through to when the new plant is commissioned late next year, with the first meeting held on Tuesday, April 22. Part of its responsibilities are to ensure effective communication across the project's progress.
