Community Services



Museum, libraries and heritage

Great news from the Ministry of Education! Late last week, the Ministry confirmed an extension to Te Awamutu Museum's current contract for delivering the Enriching Local Curriculum (ELC) programme.

Originally set to finish at the end of this year, the programme will now continue until the end of 2026 under a contract variation. The programme will also be rebranded as Education Outside the Classroom (EOTC), but there are no changes to its core objectives or how it's delivered.

The Ministry has indicated it will share more information later this year about what the programme might look like beyond 2026.

This extension is a fantastic endorsement of the valuable educational experiences the Museum provides to our local schools and tamariki.

Library internet use



A total of 317 people used the internet services at Te Awamutu Library during the month of May – an average of 12 each day. We don't currently count those using the Cambridge Library computers, but this figure will give Elected Members a good idea of how well the service is valued by people in the community.

Please note that the time taken is not counted, just the number of individual users each day. The busiest single day was Monday, May 26, when 29 people logged on in the TA library.

As there are no current costs for the use of the computers, there is no revenue captured.

This update follows the discussion at the last two Council meetings regarding the proposed introduction of a 50c per half hour fee for library internet use to the Draft Schedule of Fees and Charges for 2025-27.

Arawata Street public toilets



Council staff will be carrying out minor works next week at the Arawata Street (i-SITE) public toilets to help ensure the facility remains safe and welcoming for everyone.

This is in response to a request from the New Zealand Police Community Constable.

The power source and hot water urn — remnants from when the facility offered broader amenities — will be removed.

In recent times, these features have been used by some members of the community, including people experiencing homelessness, for cooking and charging their devices. Unfortunately, this has led to safety concerns, including a small number of incidents involving aggression toward members of the public.

Signage will be installed to inform users of the upcoming changes.

Response to 'Run It Straight' safety concerns

We've contacted rugby clubs across the district following growing concerns about the unsanctioned game known as Run It Straight.

This follows the tragic death of a teenage boy in Palmerston North last week and national messaging from New Zealand Rugby, New Zealand Rugby League, and discussions with Sport NZ and Sport Waikato.

While Council does not manage sport park bookings directly, we do have a health and safety responsibility under our role as a PCBU (Person Conducting a Business or Undertaking) when it comes to the use of Council-owned or managed facilities.

We've informed the clubs that we do not support the playing of Run It Straight on Council land. This stance is based on the game's lack of structure, supervision, and safety measures, particularly for younger participants, as well as the high risk of injury. The activity offers minimal health or fitness benefits and provides little opportunity for safe contact or defensive play.

We have encouraged all clubs and facility users to promote activities that are safe, inclusive, and supervised — aligned with recognised best practices in sport and recreation.

We appreciate the support of local clubs in helping maintain safe environments for all members of our community.

Park operations



Winter planting

The park operations teams have a big winter planting season ahead of them. Most of the sites are prepped and ready for the plants to go in the ground over the next few months. Some of the main sites around the two towns are:

- 101 Bank Street gardens
- 135 Roche St (including Museum and courtyard re-planting)
- · Stockade bank along Whitmore Street, Kihikihi
- · Teasdale Street, replanting the corner garden
- Sculpture Park, planting bluebells under the trees on the bank by SH3
- · Leamington Domain playground
- St Kilda street medians

The work will be completed by the end of August, allowing the plants time to settle into their new soil and establish feeder roots before the dry conditions return in summer.

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Service delivery

Te Awamutu water main upgrade

From Monday, June 9, we will be removing trees and shrubs in the roundabout at the intersection of Ōhaupō Road, Cambridge Road, and Arawata Street to allow for drilling and installation of a new watermain.

The 385m of pipes being installed will run from Shanel Place through to the centre of the roundabout.

Once construction is complete, replacement trees and seasonal bulbs will be planted to restore and enhance the landscape.

Play-on-the-way in Kihikihi



Last month, we installed new play-on-the-way equipment at the Whitaker Street cul-de-sac as part of the Te Ara Rimu pathway project in Kihikihi. These fun, interactive features are designed to encourage active play and support tamariki as they build confidence, learn new skills, and enjoy play as part of their everyday journeys.

Installation at the Grey Street cul-de-sac was delayed due to the need for additional planning around underground water services. We're pleased to confirm that this work is now scheduled to begin on Monday, June 9, and will be completed by Friday, June 13.

The new play features will include:

- · Climbing poles
- · A log stack
- Rope traverse
- Painted games like hopscotch, long jump, and sidesteps

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These elements are low-maintenance, designed for a wide range of ages, and intended to enhance the pathway experience for both tamariki and their whānau. Importantly, they're being installed in grassy areas at the ends of the cul-de-sacs, meaning there's no impact on existing infrastructure. The main pathway and roadway remain unaffected. While fencing won't be added, each play area is set back six metres from the road, with two berms and a footpath providing a safe buffer.

We're excited to see these playful additions come to life and help make everyday movement more engaging and family-friendly.

Planning

Plan change 14: Rezoning part of C10 Growth Cell

Council has now received the final decision report from the independent hearing panel on Plan Change 14, which has approved rezoning part of Growth Cell C10 in Cambridge from rural to industrial.

The decision will be publicly notified on Thursday, June 12 in the Cambridge News, and all submitters will be sent a copy directly. Submitters have the right to appeal the decision to the Environment Court, with the deadline for appeals set at 5pm, Thursday, July 24.

The decision will be available on the <u>Plan Change 14</u> webpage from Thursday, June 12.

This marks another key step in supporting well-planned growth and development in Cambridge.

Strategy

LTP and Water Service delivery consultations

With just a few days left to go until consultation closes, we've received 45 submissions on the draft 2025-34 Long Term Plan and 57 submissions on Local Water Done Well.

Last night there was a meeting with Te Awamutu and Cambridge Federated Farmers members. This rounded out our consultation events. In total, there were 11 public events, five meetings for invited groups, five webinars, and of course the open day at the Parallel Road Water Treatment Plant, which attracted 115 people. The water treatment operators had such a great time they want to do it again!

A huge thank you to those of you who have supported and attended our community events. Your involvement is appreciated.

Here's a quick snapshot of what we're hearing:

- Growth There's strong interest in growth, how it's funded, what we are doing to ensure it's well
 planned and what the impact is on rates.
- Funding requests We've had a few submissions from community groups and individuals seeking funding for local projects and initiatives.
- Rates and spending As expected, rates, Council spending and our priorities are hot topics.

We actively monitor the changes to legislation being proposed by Central Government, and want to keep Elected Members across the latest changes, submissions and directions.

This Bill provides a separate income abatement threshold of \$45,000 for SuperGold Card cardholders, which will take effect from Tuesday, July 1, 2025.
